<u>Phonemic Awareness</u>: Using the Heggerty Curriculum, daily lessons will provide students with repeated practice to help develop phonemic and phonological awareness skills.

<u>Science:</u> Using Mystery Science (online program) to help build understanding in the following units: Animal and Plant Superpowers, The Sun and Shadows, Moon and Stars, and Light and Sound Energy. The first graders are also given presentations by local experts from the DNR and the Jackson County Conservation Board.

<u>Social Studies</u>: Using Scholastic News, beginning of year units, Thanksgiving Units and other presenters to teach these skills.

• In first grade, students will engage in learning about themselves, their school, city and state. They will also explore the culture of their own communities by examining leadership in their community, the role goods and services play in a community, and the history of diverse cultures over time.
