## From Nurse Kelley

The cold and flu season is here, and the easiest way to stay healthy is to get a flu and COVID vaccine. Unfortunately the number of people receiving the flu vaccine along with the COVID vaccine this year has decreased. It is not too late to go and get the vaccine not only to protect yourself but to also protect the loved ones you are visiting over the holidays.

How does the flu shot work? The flu is caused by the virus called influenza. It is an unpredictable virus that mutates or changes, which is why various strains of the vaccine are created. When you receive the flu shot, your body is being introduced to a non-infectious version of the virus. That bit of influenza virus tells your body to create flu antibodies. Antibodies are the proteins in your body that fight against illnesses. The vaccine tricks your body into fighting the flu without making you feel sick.

Is it safe? Yes. Being a non-infections version of the flu virus means that the vaccine cannot give you the flu. It is the best possible way to protect yourself and others from the virus. The more people that get vaccinated, the quicker we can stop the spread of the flu in our communities, homes, schools, and workplaces this fall.

When should you get a flu shot? Ideally, you should get the flu shot before influenza activity picks up in your community, but as long as the flu virus is circulating, vaccination should continue.
